THE FESTIVAL PRECINCT

The Festival Precinct is located at Carriageworks, Eveleigh with additional events happening across the city at Sydney Town Hall and City Recital Hall.

TRAVELLING TO THE FESTIVAL PRECINCT

Carriageworks is located at 245 Wilson St, Eveleigh. This is a 10-minute walk from Redfern Station, City Road bus stops or Macdonaldtown Station. Catching public transport is strongly recommended as residential parking in the area is strictly limited. For more information on transport, visit transportnsw.info.

WALKING FROM REDFERN STATION TO CARRIAGEWORKS

Exit the station at the Little Eveleigh St exit. Turn left and follow Little Eveleigh St until you reach Wilson St. Continue left down Wilson St for approximately 7 minutes and you will arrive at Carriageworks.

TRAVELLING BETWEEN SYDNEY TOWN HALL AND CITY RECITAL HALL

Light rail services depart from George St at Town Hall every 5 minutes, with a travel time of approximately 4 minutes. Board light rail services heading to Circular Quay at the Town Hall stop and disembark at Wynyard. Head across George St to Angel Place for City Recital Hall. Walking from

Town Hall to City Recital Hall takes approximately 11 minutes. Proceed North along George St, heading towards Circular Quay. Turn right at Angel Place and you will find City Recital Hall.

FESTIVAL SHUTTLE BUS






